

1.2 Breinton is a small, largely rural, parish. Its key features are described in **Appendix A.** The issues it faces include an increasing number of elderly people, a lack of truly local facilities and its proximity to Hereford – the major centre for economic growth in the County. On the other hand large parts of the parish remain undeveloped devoted to agriculture and there is a strong community spirit locally.

This Community Led Plan tries to address these issues and a number of others.

- 1.3 The CLP has a number of predecessors. A Parish Plan was produced in 2005 and **Appendix B** summarises the progress made on its recommendations in the last nine years. Many of the issues remain relevant today. More recently a group of volunteers worked to produce a Sustainability Action Plan for the parish. This identified a considerable number of opportunities to make Breinton more sustainable in future. These are summarised in **Appendix C** and many of them have been carried forward into this CLP.
- 1.4 To produce this CLP the Steering Group established by the Parish Council followed the process laid down by Herefordshire Council. More details of what this involved are given in Appendix D. This process included a number of public events and a parish questionnaire in 2013. There were different questionnaires for adults (those of 18 years and older) and young people (those aged from 6 to 17 years). 66% of adults in the parish completed the questionnaire as did 62% of all young people aged between 6 and 18 years. This was an exceptionally high response rate in comparison to similar exercises in this and other parishes.
- An overall timetable of all events contributing to the Community Led Plan is given in **Appendix E**.
- The Steering Group considered how to turn the answers to the questionnaire into a plan. They commissioned a statistical summary of the questionnaire results with tables and graphs from Herefordshire Council's Research Team. A more detailed report was then produced by Tony Cramp, an independent statistician. This took all the information on all the topics covered by the questionnaire and brought together the key facts and findings. These are summarised in Section 2 below. The full details of the report by Tony Cramp are contained in Appendix G.

2.0 Summary and Key Findings from the Parish Questionnaire (See Appendix G for the full report on the Parish Questionnaire, as produced by Tony Cramp)

2.1 The Questionnaire

Community Led Plan questionnaires were delivered to every household in Breinton Parish in February 2013. A copy of the adult version of the questionnaire was provided for each adult over 18 and a young person's questionnaire for each resident aged 6 to 17 years.

By the closing date of 25th February, 478 adult and 52 young person's questionnaires had been completed giving a response rate of 66% of those aged 18 and over and 62% of 6 to 17 year olds (according to 2011 census).

Of the adult questionnaires completed, 47% were by men and 53% by women, they were divided approximately equally between those who lived in the Kings Acre Road area and those elsewhere in the parish, and 60% were from residents who had lived in Breinton for over 10 years.

2.2 Roads, road safety and travel

The car was overwhelmingly the most commonly used means of transport with over three quarters (77%) of survey respondents using it daily, a further 14% weekly, while just 1% of respondents indicated that they never used a car. Over a quarter of respondents walked daily.

9% of respondents have problems resulting from lack of transport, most commonly due to the bus service being too infrequent, especially in the evenings and weekends.

Most people (61%) would not use a scheme to make private transport more accessible. However just over a quarter (27%) would use a community transport scheme.

Over 60% or respondents believe there are serious traffic or road safety issues in Breinton. These were most commonly speeding vehicles or poor road conditions (potholes). A similar proportion would like to see the Parish Council lobby for speed restrictions or other traffic calming measures. About half the comments on this topic (about a quarter of all survey respondents) wanted to see speed restrictions either throughout Breinton or in specific places, such as Kings Acre Road or some or all of the rural lanes in Breinton.

Around three quarters of residents would like the Parish Council to push for cycleways.

2.3 Future uses of land, and housing

Residents considered it important that Breinton retains its rural character, with 78% who said it's very important and a further said 16% fairly important. This was particularly so for residents in areas other than the Kings Acre Road area, of whom 85% said it was very important compared with 69% of residents of the Kings Acre Road area.

Almost four out of five residents agreed with the Parish Council opposing the plan for a western relief road for Hereford.

There was very strong, virtually universal, support for continuing to use the land for agricultural purposes, while a majority were opposed to commercial or light industrial uses especially distribution / warehousing though less so for small offices. There was more support than opposition for tourism uses, while housing and second homes were, on balance, not considered appropriate use of the land.

When asked for their views if there were to be new housing, as existing plans identified, around a third said there should be no new housing, while 44% said there should be some limit. Around two thirds expressed the view that any new housing should be on previously used sites and a similar number said it was preferable that it should be based on conversion of redundant buildings where possible.

Nearly two thirds of respondents felt that any new housing should be for people with local connections and family homes with three or more bedrooms were the size preferred by nearly half of respondents. A similar proportion also indicated that new homes should be adapted for easy access.

Nearly three quarters of respondents would want any new homes built to be available to buy on the open market and a large majority (71%) favoured a traditional design. Two thirds of respondents would want them to be of high energy saving standards, exceeding current government targets.

2.4 Facilities, services, leisure and environment

Nearly half of the respondents said they would use cycle paths if they were provided locally and over a third would be interested in resource sharing schemes such as bulk buying of fuel.

The village hall was used by over half (56%) of respondents, at least occasionally, while fewer people used the St Michael's Church (46%). Whilst overall 54% said they have never used the Church amongst those who have lived in Breinton for 5 years or less, four fifths or 80% have never used it.

Musical concerts, exercise classes and car boot sales were amongst the most popular additional activities that people would use if provided at the Church or Village Hall, each selected by around a third of respondents.

The most common reasons cited amongst those who do not use organised leisure facilities in Breinton was that they do not match their interests (56%), that they use facilities elsewhere (37%), or that they were not aware of them (27%). Common amongst the other reasons given was a lack of time due to work or family commitments.

Around one in ten people had problems with fuel costs and a similar number with gardening, decorating or DIY.

A large proportion, around four fifths, of respondents were very or fairly concerned with illegal dumping and litter in the parish and a majority (around two thirds) expressed concern about each of the other topics listed – dog fouling, burglary/theft and vandalism. About half the residents who responded were concerned about all five of the issues listed, and there was an indication that those aged over 65 were more likely than younger people to be concerned about all five issues.

2.5 Communication

Over three quarters (78%) of respondents used the internet, including 96% of those aged under 45 years, and over half of those who used it found their activities restricted by slow broadband speeds.

Around one in ten residents found the Parish Council website useful, while nearly half hadn't used it and a further 39% were unaware of it.

A majority of over three quarters of residents found Teamtalk useful and around two thirds preferred to be kept informed about Parish Council and Local government business by reports within it.

2.6 Young people's questionnaire

Amongst young people (aged 6-17), spending time with their friends and playing computer games / using the internet was the most popular spare time activity.

Three quarters of young people would like to see safer cycle routes and over half of them would like to see a safe playground. A similar number would like a sports pitch.

Improved bus services and cycle routes were the predominant suggestion amongst younger people to increase the local transport options.

3.0 Drafting the Community Led Plan

3.1 The detailed analysis of results from the Parish Questionnaires contained in Tony Cramp's report was used by the Steering Group to start drafting this Community Led Plan. Each section of the questionnaires was discussed in turn at a number of meetings and information from the Cramp report allowed these to be summarised into policies. Each of these policies has a number of parts. Further information was extracted from the Cramp report to provide a summary list of evidence from the questionnaires for these policies and this list is at Appendix F. These policies are not only supported by evidence from the questionnaire results but also from information in the 2012 Sustainability Action Plan (SAP) and with actions suggested by those people who replied to the questionnaires. As a first draft, these policies, the sources of evidence for them and the possible actions which would make them meaningful are all shown in TABLE 1 which follows.

NB The Steering Group took the text in *italics* in TABLE 1 above and either amended it or merged it with other text before including in the Action Plan (TABLE 2) which follows. In a few cases it was decided not to use some *italicised* text at all in the Action Plan (TABLE 2). The Steering Group wanted an Action Plan that was as Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Realistic and Timely (SMART) as possible and some reasons why text was not included in Table 2 are explained in paragraph 3.2.

EXPLANATION OF TABLE 1 above.

SAP: Sustainability Action Plan. See Appendix C

1, 2 etc: used in the middle column of TABLE 1 denote evidence from answers to questions 1, 2 etc of the questionnaire completed by adults aged 18 and over. In many cases the answers to a particular question contain more than one piece of evidence so these separate pieces are identified as '1a', '1b', '1c' and so on

YP1, YP2 etc: used in the middle column of TABLE 1 refers to Question 3 from the questionnaire completed by young people aged 6 to 17 years inclusive. Where there is more than one piece of evidence in the answers to a particular question this will be shown as YP1a, YP1b etc

- **3.2** Having drafted TABLE 1 (above) the Steering Group met on a number of occasions to consider how it could be converted into an Action Plan that was Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Realistic and Timely. Achievable was taken to mean:-
 - within a reasonable length of time,
 - given the powers of the Parish Council,
 - with the funding likely to be available,
 - given the need get other organisations and bodies to act and
 - acknowledging the limited number of volunteers available locally.
- 3.3 The actions listed in TABLE 2 which follows, will help to make the Policies suggested by the results of the Parish Questionnaire real. However any particular action needs to be completed or followed through consistently for progress to be made with the Policy.

5.0 Conclusions

The Action Plan (TABLE 2) will be used to guide the actions of the Parish Council over the next few years. This draft was approved in draft form for consultation in January 2013 and the CLP will be agreed in its final form by the Council in February 2014. At the same time an Annual Work Plan will be discussed which will describe what actions will follow. Progress against the Annual Work Plan will be reviewed at least twice a year at regular Parish Council meetings or at parish events.

The CLP will also be used as a basis for developing local land use planning policies in collaboration with Herefordshire Council and other interested parties. Clearly the Parish Council has to work within the overall planning policies of Herefordshire Council. However, every opportunity will be taken to influence these. These opportunities include using the 2014 CLP to develop a Neighbourhood Plan. Despite the recession there is so much change being proposed for Hereford and its immediate hinterland that it is really important that local people have the opportunity to say how they would like their community to develop. If a Neighbourhood Plan is developed and successfully completes the statutory process (including an examination in public and a local referendum) it will have legal status as planning policy.
